Recently two longtime Silver Fork residents took a short hike into the woods and noticed a small moose lying on the ground. Adjusting to the shady light, they then noticed the mama moose lying down, and realized her baby moose was just being born. Another small moose stood close by. Mama moose gave a "No Photos" glare and the couple hurried on, blinded by the wonder they had stumbled upon. A week later this photo appeared on Facebook of what is likely that new little family.

Moose babies are not only adorable, they are miraculous mammals that can run faster than humans at just three days old. Moose twins weigh approximately 14 pounds each and pack on an estimated pound a day to finally reach an adult weight of about 1400 pounds in a couple of years. At birth, they are over two feet tall, with most of the height in their legs. Watch for them in wetland areas and drive carefully in case they decide to cross the road, especially at night and twilight.

HISTORIC CONSTRUCTION YEAR



This 1940s photo shows the Salt Lake Aquaduct being installed as a main drinking water conduit from Big Cottonwood Canyon to Salt Lake City. It's currently being updated by Salt Lake City Public Utilities. The current Big Cottonwood Water Treatment Plant, built in 1959, will also be remodeled (but not until after the 2034 Olympics). In another historic step, Rocky Mountain Power agreed to underground electric lines in Big Cottonwood. For these reasons, we are experiencing a historic record number of construction projects in the canyon. Here are highlights:

Wasatch Blvd/Ft.Union Intersection: August 13-30, there will be significant traffic delays for 3 weeks with single lanes in both directions. This is part of the new SLC water pipeline that will continue down Ft. Union Blvd to Nutree Drive, then proceed south to connect with Sandy's Metro Water Treatment plant. Guardsmans Pass: Monday, August 19 - 22, Guardsman Pass Road between the Winter Gate and the Pass Overlook will be closed to all daytime traffic to allow crews to safely shoulder and stripe the road. Drivers headed toward Park City, or the Heber Valley will need to reroute via I-80 (Parley's Canyon) or US-189 (Provo Canyon). During this work, Guardsman Pass Road will reopen every night and close again early the following morning to allow for uninterrupted late-night travel. The road is scheduled to reopen for daytime travel as early as **Friday, Aug. 23.**

Big Cottonwood Road: Monday, August 19 - 22, crews will begin grinding and striping between the Mouth of Big Cottonwood Canyon and Mineral Fork Trailhead (MP 1-8). During this time, drivers can expect one-way alternating traffic controlled by flaggers and pilot cars. This work is a rolling operation, meaning the road will be closed in one-mile increments with changing traffic patterns.

Rocky Mountain Power Project

Cardiff/Mt.Haven Area: Crews are boring and installing conduit on Cardiff Fork Road, laying road base, cleaning up and hauling off debris on Moose Haven Lane and Wild Clematis

Forest Glen Area: Crews are installing boxes and trenching along Lupine Ridge Road, then will start trenching at the top of Wilderness Road. The entry gate will be blocked during the day. Please use the green gate off Skyline View Lane.



SILVER LAKE BOARDWALK UPDATE

The Silver Lake Boardwalk restoration project is almost finished. There is a 280 ft. portion near the Visitor Center that was paid for by the Town of Brighton. When an unexpected funding shortfall came as a result of the need to drive the boardwalk posts deeper to bedrock than anticipated, the Town stepped in to help the Forest Service with \$120,000. The Town Council decided it was in the best interest of the Town and the thousands of visitors who need a beautiful place to recreate. Thanks Forest Service, Trails Utah, and Town of Brighton for this stellar new Silver Lake boardwalk.

DID YOU KNOWS

The total cost for the main boardwalk portion of the project is almost \$3 million from USFS. Renovation of the soft surface trail portion cost approximately \$400K, furnished by Trails Utah, plus the extra boardwalk section funded by the Town of Brighton for \$120K. The entire project cost stands at almost \$3.5 M. During the summer and fall seasons, Silver Lake can see up to 4000 visitors a day! The estimate for annual visitation to Silver Lake is 250,000 people.



CHIPPER DAYS RECORD

UFA Wildland Fire Crews are back in the neighborhood chipping slash and brush piles after being called out on a wildfire last week. So far, it's our largest Chipper Days ever, with a record 110

families signed up. In all, neighbors spent 1550 hours and over \$2,000 in arborist costs. UFA asks that we keep track of the hours and dollars spent clearing wood and brush because we use that as in-kind match for the next year's Chipper Days grant. Thanks to Emergency Manager Jane Martain for coordinating this project, and to all participants for helping Brighton be a Defensible Space.

Sustainable School Options

As back-to-school time approaches, we're all investing in new supplies. Here are some tips for saving money and protecting the environment while restocking your student's supplies:



- Take Inventory: Start by checking what items you have from last year that can be used again.
- Choose Sustainable Options: Consider eco-friendly and sustainable choices when buying new items, such as recycled mechanical pencils and reusable water bottles.

What Types of Plastic Go in the Recycling Dumpsters?

Recycling plastics can be confusing, but this guide will help you become a recycling pro!

PET (#1) and HDPE (#2): Containers of this resin type are widely accepted and include beverage, condiment, and detergent bottles, food tubs, milk jugs, and similar containers. Small to medium containers labeled #1 or #2 are generally recyclable.

PP (#5): This includes yogurt and cottage cheese containers, pill bottles, and some foodgrade jars. NOTE: It must match the shape of the items listed above. If an item does match those shapes, it likely isn't accepted in single-stream recycling.



OTHER PLASTICS: Generally, these are not accepted in single-stream recycling. Use our "Recycle Right" tool at https://wasatchfrontwaste.org/how-recycle for specific recycling options and to confirm what items are accepted.
