TRANSPORTATION SURVEY DUE FEBRUARY 10, 2023

The Big Cottonwood Canyon Mobility Action Plan (BCC MAP) will build on previous studies and public input to find solutions that will improve mobility in Big Cottonwood Canyon throughout the year. WATER TREATMENT PLANT REBUILD

The Big Cottonwood Water Treatment Plant (BCWTP), located in Big Cottonwood Canyon, is owned and operated by Salt Lake City Department of Public Utilities (SLCDPU) as a critical component of SLCDPU's drinking water system. The plant currently supplies 40% of the drinking water in the department's regional service area!

BCWTP needs to be rebuilt (within its existing fence line) to improve plant safety and continue to protect public health by providing clean, delicious drinking water to the surrounding communities.



The BCWTP project team is currently in the design phase of BCWTP Rebuild Project with construction slated to begin in late 2026. For any questions, please feel free to connect with the project team:

COTTONWOOD CONNECT SHUTTLES

In an effort to help the Cottonwoods with the influx of winter traffic, the Salt Lake County Council approved \$240,000 dollars to provide shuttles for the ski season. Additional funding comes from Visit Salt Lake (\$50,000), UTA (\$75,000) and the ski resorts (\$50,000). Snow Country Limousine will provide vans and mini-coaches Thursdays through Sundays until April 16.

Riders will need to reserve a space at the *Visit Salt Lake* website and pay a \$10 round-trip fee. The routes will serve Sandy, Midvale and

NEW INTERACTIVE PARKING MAP FOR BRIGHTON

The MSD has created an interactive Parking Map that shows where parking is available in Brighton. People can use it to determine where they can park legally to avoid those \$150 parking tickets. THE SILVER FORK BACK STORY

Presented by the Big Cottonwood Historical Society

Big Cottonwood Lumber Company, organized in 1854 by Brigham Young and Daniel H. Wells, erected two water-powered sawmills and a small shingle mill at the mouth of Silver Fork Canyon. Pioneers in Salt Lake City desperately needed lumber to build their great City. Log homes, stores, a church, and even a Post Office were built to accommodate the families that moved into the mountains. It was a bustling year-round community. However, over the years all the trees were gone, so the sawmills had to be relocated and the lumber town was partially abandoned.

But the little town sprang back to life in the 1870s when silver mines were discovered and claimed in Silver Fork and Honeycomb Canyons. Among the productive mines were The Prince of Wales Mine, the Highland Chief, the Warrior, the Lucky Dutchman, Little Dollie and the Antelope Group Mines developed by the Walker Brothers. A small smelter was built in 1871 by Wightman & Co. The mining boom ended in the mid 1880's and the little town was abandoned again. Then, in 1893, the area was homesteaded by Joy Dunyon who ran sheep in Silver Fork Canyon for many years. Around 1925, the Dunyon family subdivided the land, and the present community of Silver Fork with its many summer homes and mountain cabins came to be.

Currently there are about 197 homes with 125 summer homes (63%), and 72 full-time homes (37%). The average home was built in 1968. The Neilson and Hulse families put in the first water system back in the 1940's. It has been regularly updated and delivers sparkling Best-In-State award-winning water to the community.
